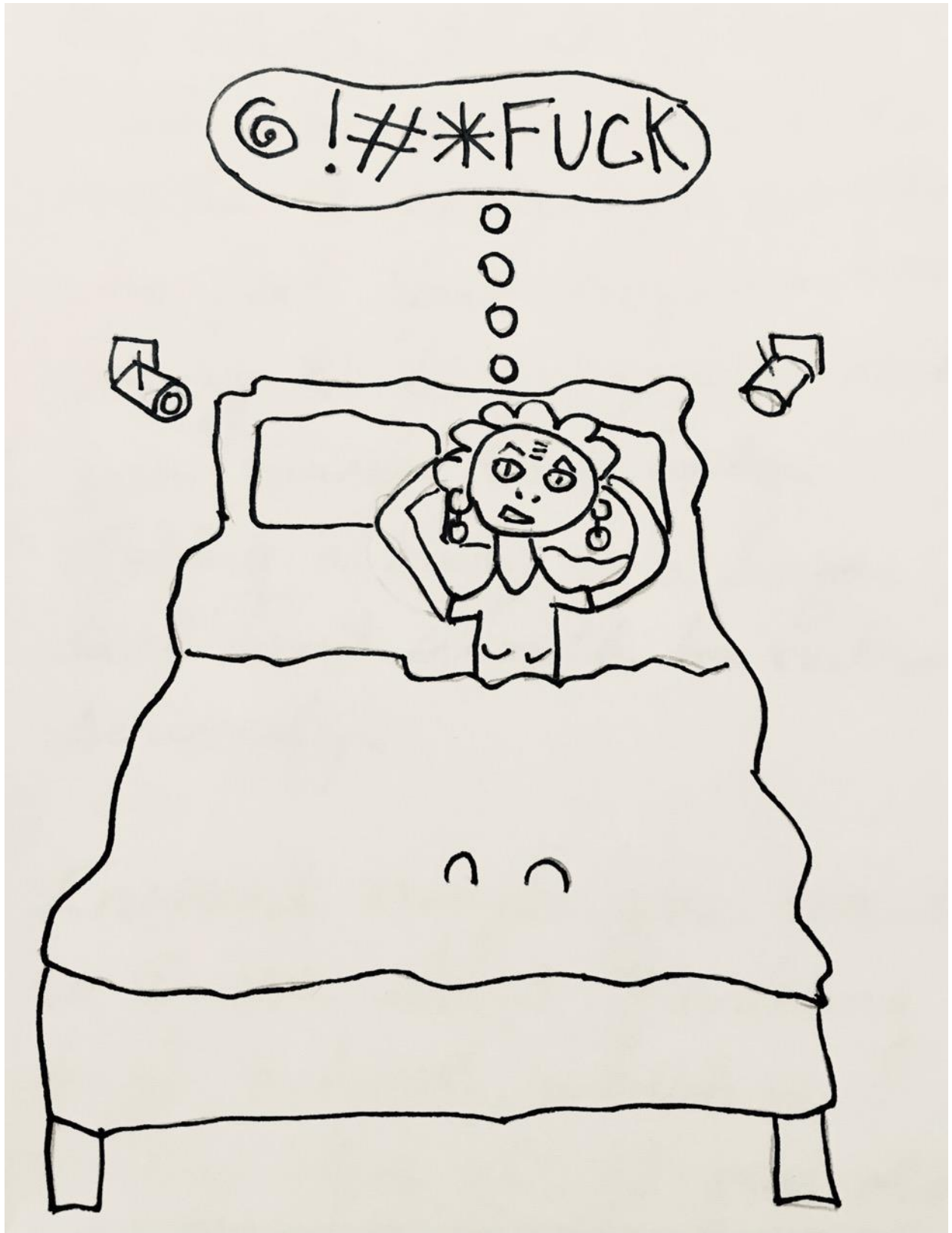


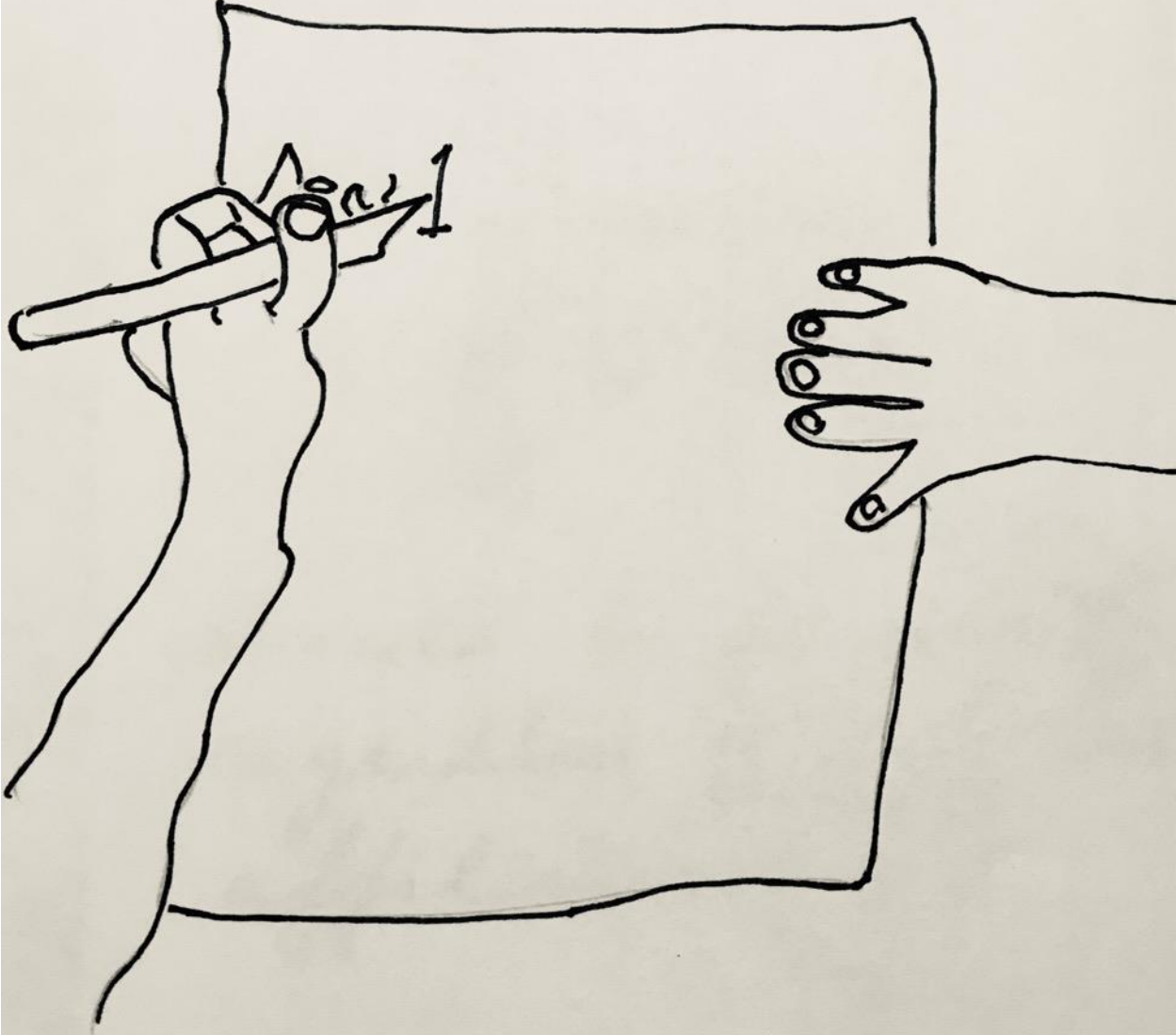
The end of ROE

to be an 18-year-old.

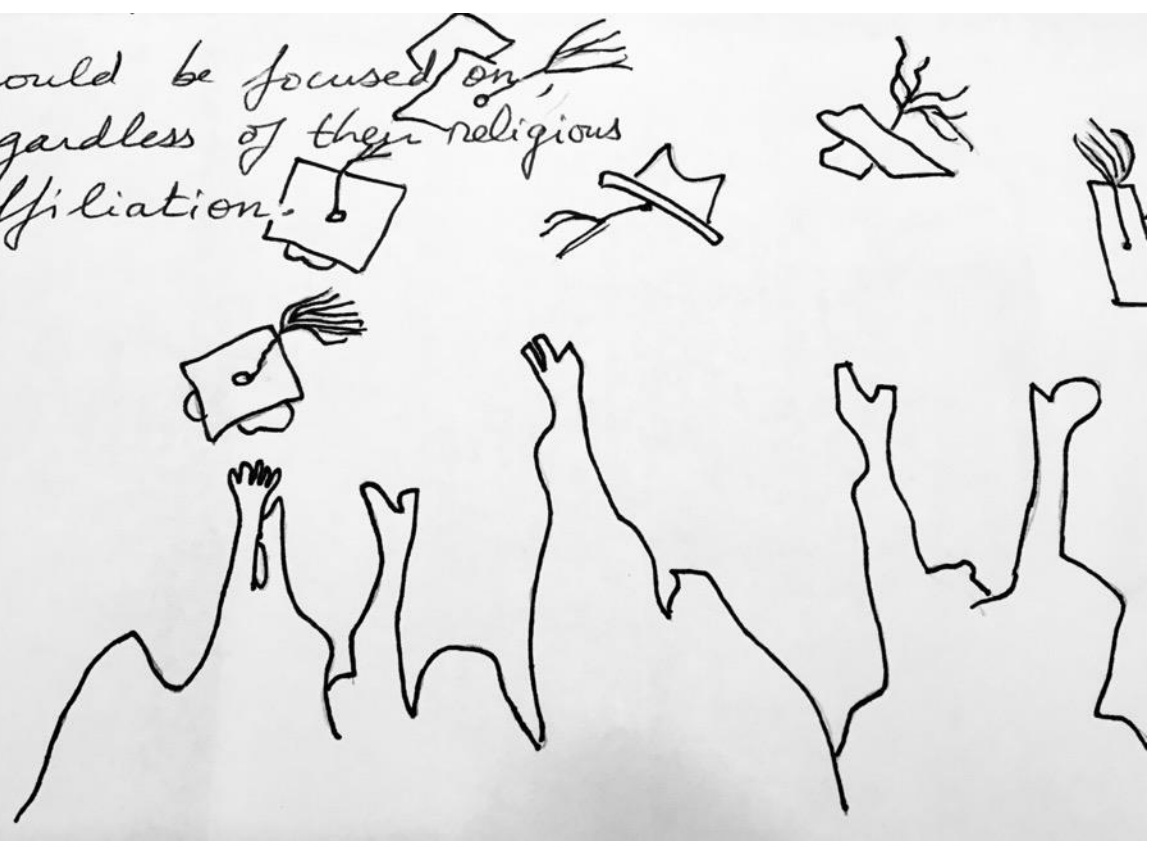


The whole point of legalized abortions is (was) to make it easier for women who feel that they are too young to be pregnant and give birth to a baby.

Instead maybe you want to think about finishing high school, which is really what all 18-year-olds

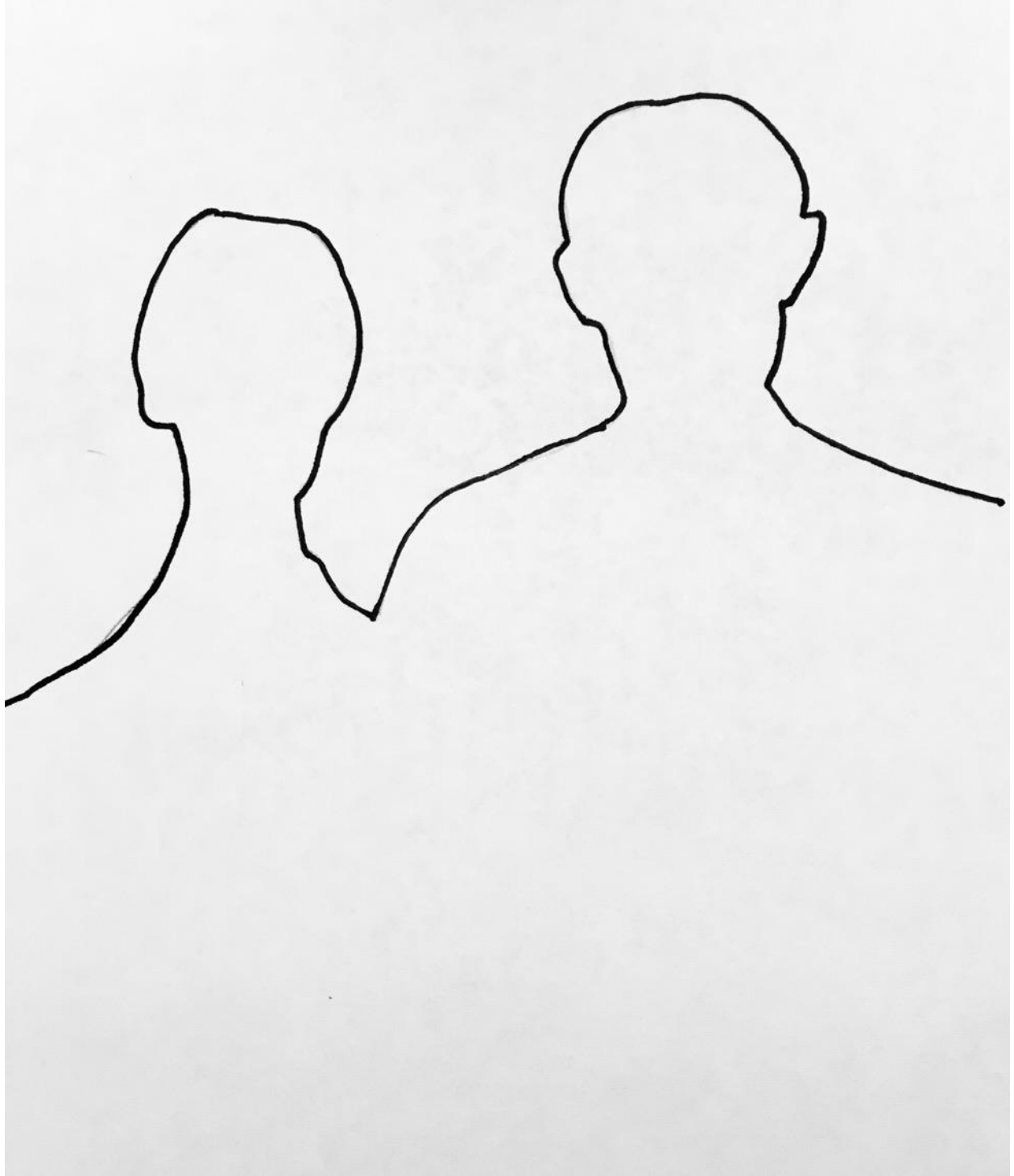
should be focused on,

affiliation.

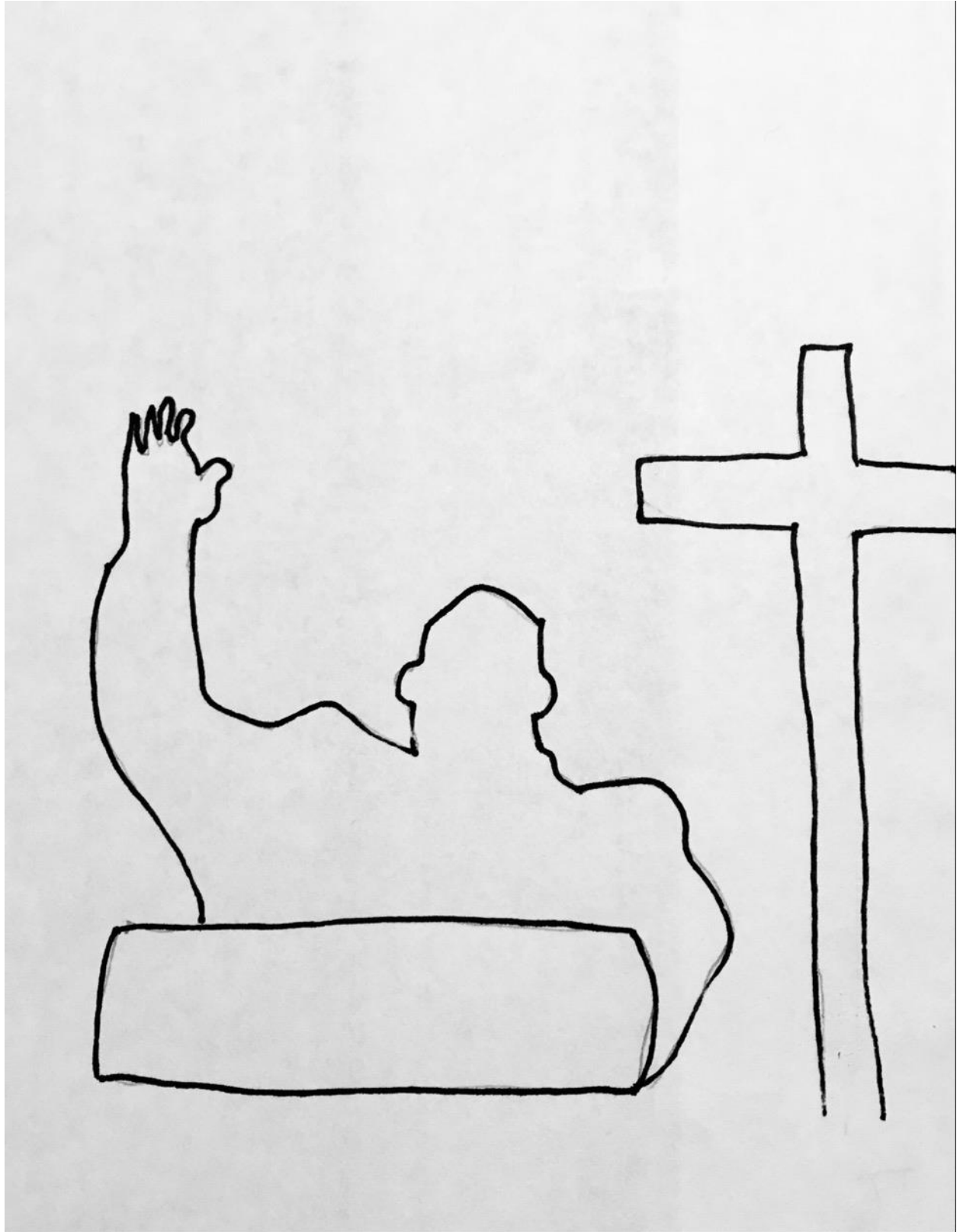


A law that protects a woman's right to end her pregnancy allows her to become an adult gradually, one step at a time.

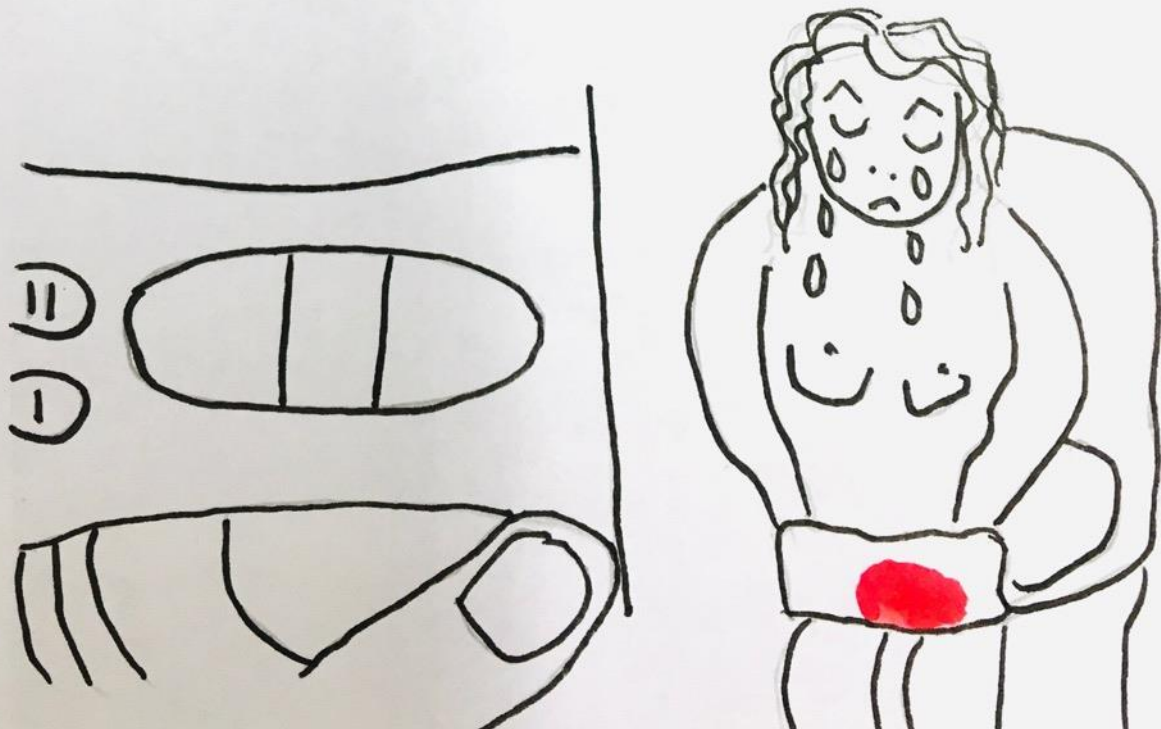


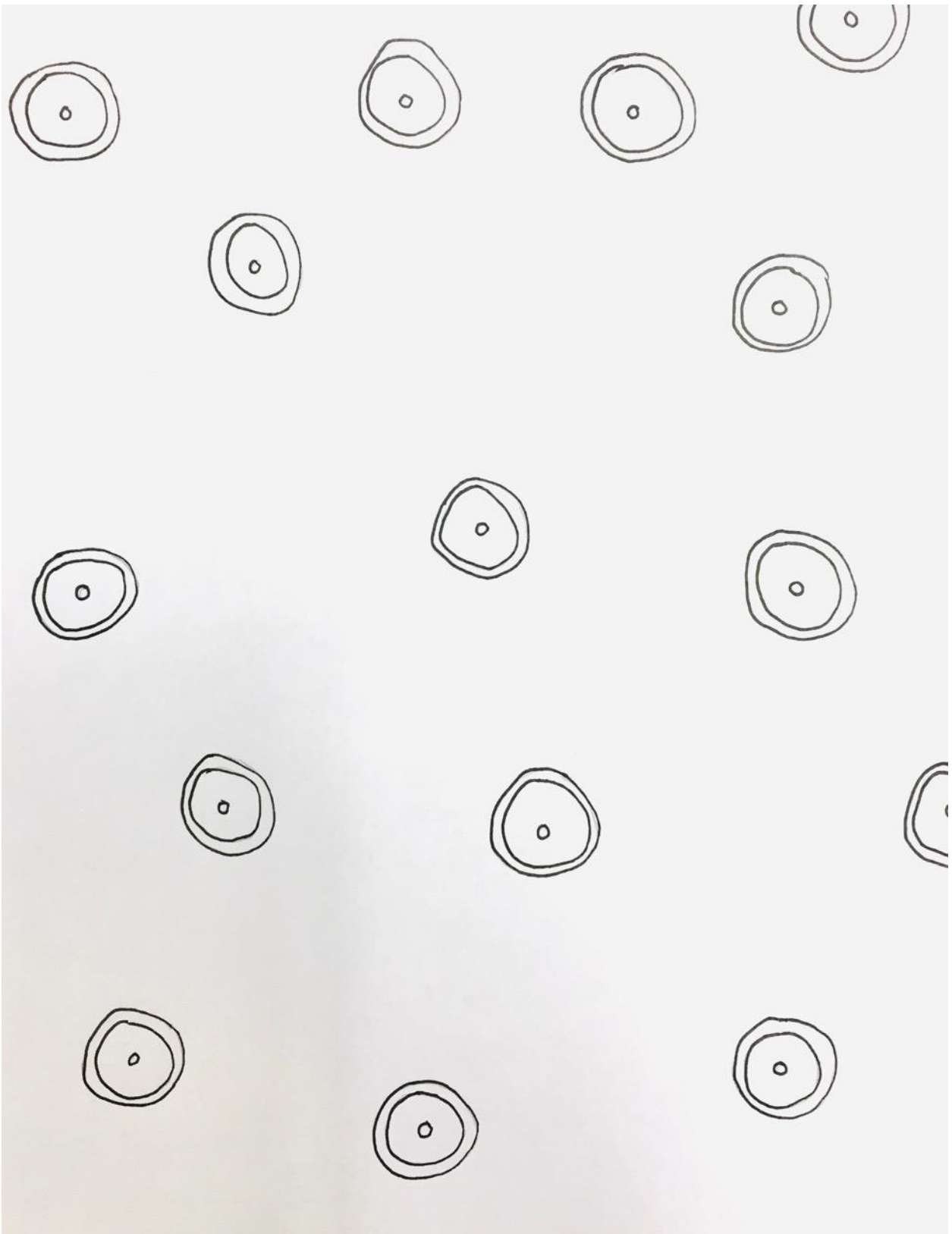
Let's look at this idea

zations come to an end.



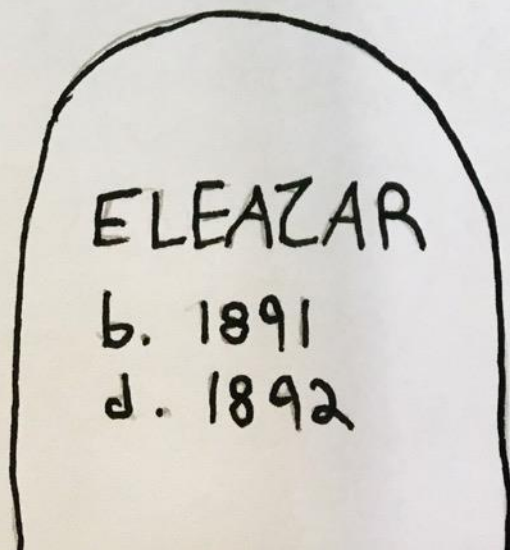


The rate of miscarriage depends on the woman's age and a whole bunch of other factors.

My first pregnancy ended in miscarriage, at around ten weeks, which was a real bummer.



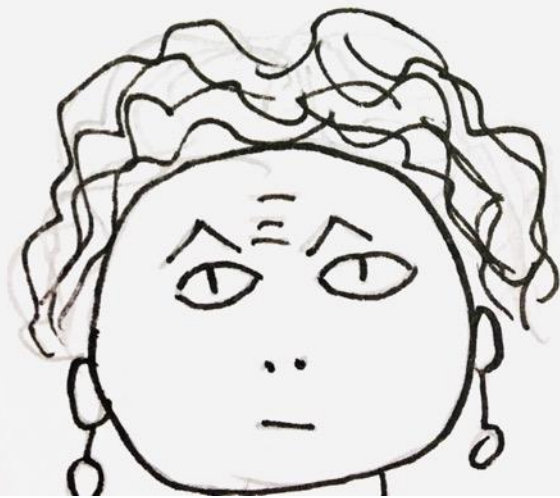
Speaking of real bummers,

very slim as well.



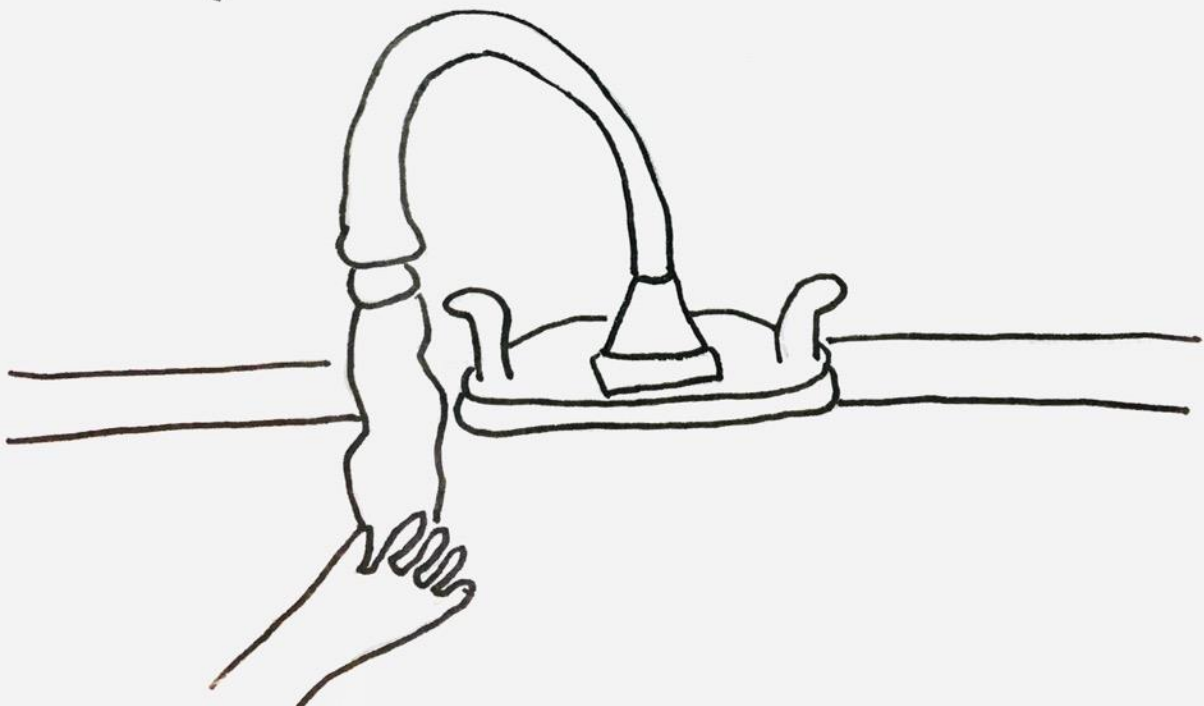

journey.



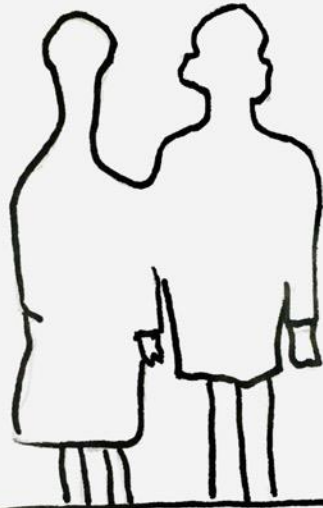
So when you say that life begins at conception, or that once there is fertilization, that's a baby in there, and that abortion is murder, well, that's an opinion, not a fact.

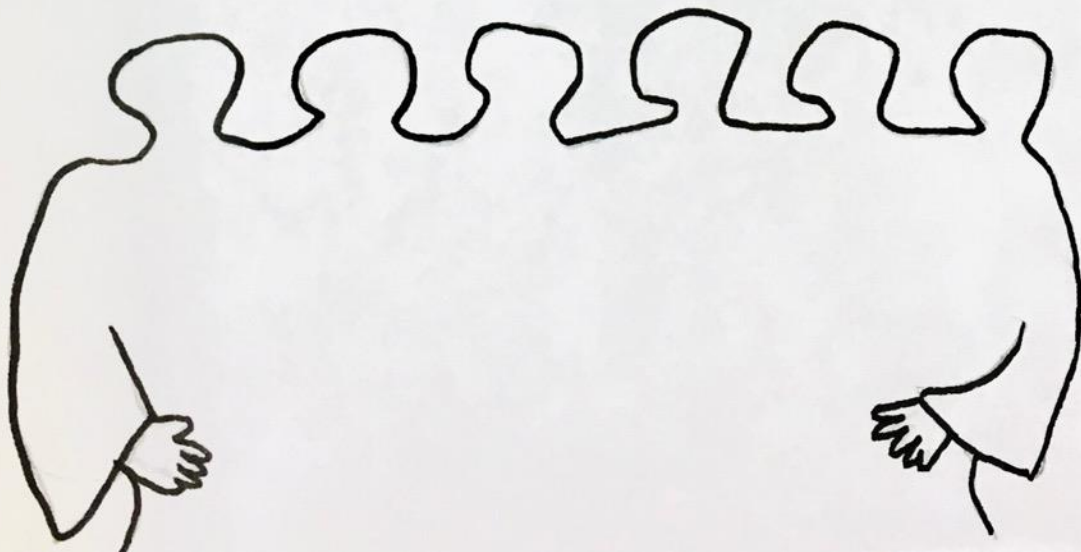


Well okay then.

women's pregnancies.

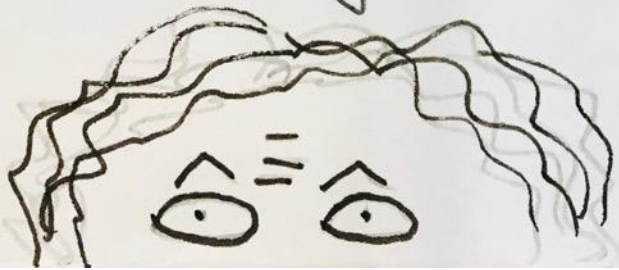
